COMING HOME TO PROVIDENCE

2001 AMERICAN BAPTIST BIENNIAL

"This Biennial is an historic moment for American Baptists," says Linda Bonn. "This is the first Biennial in the new millennium and in the place where Baptists were birthed. We're coming home—together. We're going to honor our heritage and celebrate our present ministries and envision our future."

The 2001 Biennial Meeting of American Baptist Churches USA will be held in Providence, Rhode Island, June 22-25, 2001. As Biennial Coordinator, Linda Bonn oversees the planning of a Biennial and the thousands of details that result.

Linda meets with the Biennial Program Committee, which starts their work 18 months ahead of time. Six members are selected from the general board and six from local ABC churches. The denominational president and the vice president also serve. This year's co-chairs are Donald Shuler and Philip Brown.

The 1999 Biennial piloted a regional youth representatives program. The Biennial Program Committee and the Regional Executive Ministers Council cooperatively sponsored selected youth to serve in leadership roles and participate in business sessions. Sixty-three young people from 23 regions participated.

"These young people gave a sense of energy and life to the Biennial," smiles Linda. "They sat together—without chaperones—in front and cheered on everything." Fifty-five

youth from 25 regions will participate in the 2001 Biennial.

Because the committee meets only three times, a staff advisory group meets regularly to flesh out what the committee envisions. "The group's agendas are unbelievable," marvels Linda, "and we work nonstop to plan a Biennial that has something for everybody."

For the first time, this year's Biennial will be held over a weekend. No business will be held on Sunday and fees will be waived that day so everyone can attend free.

"This will just be a grand day of celebration," says Linda. "During Sunday worship we will pray for every American Baptist church. The Hall of Ministries will be the place where our mission is communicated and people can learn about what is happening throughout American Baptist Churches USA."

Linda's first "professional" Biennial experience was in Pittsburgh in 1987. Her pastor at First Baptist Church, Pasadena, California, Harold Lang, was serving as Biennial program chair and nominated her to serve as music consultant. She has been working on Biennials every since.

Linda and her husband, James Bonn, design and lead worship for denominational and ecumenical conferences. She is the author of the book, The Work of the Worship Committee.

After twenty years of ministry in two local American Baptist congregations, in 1995 Linda became director of Special Services for American Baptist Churches, and then in 1999, Biennial coordinator. The office of Special Services handles all the logistics, housing, and transportation for General Board, Biennial and other denominational meetings. "They are the invisible ministries that make the machinery work," explains Linda. "Registration, travel, accomodations, and food quality can make it or break it for attendees. Good arrangements guarantee good times."

Linda tells about a 92-year old woman who told her how much she appreciated the "door-to-door service" so that she could be with her ABC family. "That kind of conversation is important to me," says Linda, "and makes it worthwhile."

Shelter from the Rain, Shade from the Heat

Robert Lamp had it all: a loving wife, Mary; two children he adored, Destiny and Robert Jr.; and a good job in construction that provided for his family. But when he injured his back, he was unable to keep that job. A skilled employee, he secured a series of construction and warehouse jobs, but lost them all due to his back injury, which left him unable to perform his duties. Rent was due; bills were piling up. The momentum was too strong. Evicted, Robert, Mary, and the kids first lived with Robert's sisters. After that, they lived in a tent in Robert's mother's backyard. Finally, with nowhere left to go, they lived in their car.


This was no life for two young children—Robert and Mary knew that. Rather than allow their children to grow up with nothing, Robert and Mary wrestled with the heart-rending decision to give Destiny and Robert Jr. up for adoption. At least then, they reasoned, the kids would have a chance.

But Robert and Mary found another chance—in the form of a homeless shelter, supported in part by funds from One Great Hour of



Sharing. With the blankets, meals, and sanctuary provided them, Robert and Mary began to rebuild their lives. It took time, patience, and faith, but today Mary is a restaurant manager, bringing in enough money to support the family in their new apartment. In this hard-won home, Robert cares for his children, his treasure.

The prophet Isaiah wrote, of God, "You have been a refuge to the poor, a refuge to the needy in their distress, a shelter from the rainstorm and a shade from the heat." As God saw the Israelites in hunger and showered down manna, God recognizes individual joy and pain, seeing each complex person, each unique need instead of grouping us into categories like "the homeless" or "the poor." In ancient stories and in our times, God's vast provision wears each person's name. Moses. Sarah. Esther. Paul. Robert. Listen to those names. You'll hear your own.

ABC Educational Ministries is working toward a decade-long goal to identify 1,010 American Baptist congregations engaged in caring ministries with children and youth in their communities. More than a hundred churches have let us know about their community ministries, often done in partnership with schools, courts, social service agencies, and other community partners. American Baptists are

making a difference as they reach out, care, and bring hope to young people who often have had little or no contact with a church. And we're learning that the excitement of changing lives is transforming those congregations!

At the Educational Ministries Luncheon, we will honor four outstanding American Baptists for distinguished service in ministries of discipleship and education:

- Dr. David H. Swinton, president of Benedict College, Columbia, South Carolina, will receive the Luther Wesley Smith Award for distinguished service in higher education.
- Ms. Linda R. Isham of Suffield, Connecticut, will receive the Kenneth L. Cober Award for outstanding service in regional ministry.
- Dr. Howard G. Ness will receive the Newton C. Fetter Award for his service as campus minister for more than 20 years at Purdue University.
- Rev. Julius C. Herrin of New Smyrna Beach, Florida, will receive the Richard Hoiland Award for his work in encouraging hundreds of black students to pursue a college education.

The Biennial will also feature practical workshops and mission tours on Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

If you're coming to Providence, take advantage of the many Biennial opportunities to learn more about American Baptist mission!

Can't make it to Providence in June? You can still create some mission excitement in your church on Biennial weekend. Here's how:

- Hook up a computer in the fellowship hall and invite the congregation to surf the ABC websites. They are all linked from www.abc-usa.org. Leave your name and a message for other Biennial attendees in Educational Ministries' guest book!
- Host your own "Meet Your Missionaries" workshop at church. Invite several individuals in your congregation who are engaged in mission in your church and community. Ask them to each share about their ministry (7 minutes max!) and invite questions. Close the session with prayer for each one.
- Plan an awards banquet at church and honor Bible teachers and Sunday school leaders who have made a significant difference in the lives of children, youth, and adults through the years.







New Life Youth Media Project

A **NEW LIFE 2010** PROJECT-

YOUTH TRAINED TO TELL THE GOOD NEWS

A dozen youth in Denver are discovering the Good News and making some of their own through an American Baptist mission partnership that presents the Gospel and offers training in digital storytelling. The New Life Youth Media Project, a biblically based media awareness and skills course, was launched this spring at Curtis Park Community Center, a Neighborhood Action Christian Center related to National Ministries.

New Life Youth Media provides junior- and senior-high school students with an opportunity to explore God's story and their place in it. Students obtain a basic background in scripting, shooting, and editing before being deployed as digital journalists to tell



stories related to NEW LIFE 2010 in their region.

National Ministries is sponsoring the experiment as a NEW LIFE 2010 project. "The advent of the Internet, broadband technology, and the accessibility of media hardware and software is transforming how stories are told and received," says Dr. Aidsand F. Wright-Riggins III, National Ministries executive director. "Even more important is the change in who tells stories. We see New Life Youth Media as a way to use technology for both empowerment and evangelism."

Curtis Park staff and its executive

director, James Willis, recruited a diverse group of youth for the experimental project and to coordinate the week-to-week meetings and intensives. "We are excited to have this opportunity," said Willis. "The project gives us resources to do what we have dreamed of doing in this area."

Led by Denver-based media professionals, the students are producing a video news magazine that will be available in several formats, including streaming video on National Ministries' website. Rev. Gordon Salsman, associate executive minister of the American Baptist Churches of the Rocky Mountains, is helping to develop story ideas.

In June, the Curtis Park youth and sponsoring adults will travel to the American Baptist Biennial Meeting in Providence, Rhode Island, to share their experiences and cover the "new life" they encounter there.

NEW LIFE 2010 is the American Baptist vision to plant 1,010 new churches, reach 1,000,010 new believers, vitalize a multitude of caring ministries, and so transform congregations by 2010.

"Just pull yourself up by your own bootstraps!" That's no answer to the complex problems of the poor, says James Willis. "When we see a young child living in poverty, we need to ask, 'If I were a young child in that setting, how would I ever improve my situation without help?"

Curtis Park Community Center extends a helping hand in four different locations in Denver. "We are a multi-faceted agency, serving infants to seniors," Willis explains. A unique day care program for families in domestic abuse and homeless shelters allows parents to receive counseling and search for employment. After school programs and a junior high employment project involving computers reach children and youth.

Curtis Park is a Christian Center related to National Ministries Neighborhood Action Program. In one year, the Center served more than 36,000 people.

Ask anyone who has gone on a short-term mission trip, and they will almost certainly tell you that it is one of the most intense experiences of their life, a turning point in how they view themselves, their church, the world, and ultimately, how they understand who God is.

Are you considering God's call to mission? There are many ways that you can serve—diverse gifts are needed to fill the ever-growing number of volunteer positions available.

Volunteers come in all shapes, sizes and ages, and they come from all walks of life. God has given each person unique gifts and talents. But what all volunteers have in common is a desire to love and serve God and their brothers and sisters in prayerful, productive partnerships in every corner of the globe.

A GUIDE TO HELP YOU PLAN

Is your church interested in sending a short-term mission team but just isn't sure how to go about it? A new resource is available to help groups prepare for a short-term mission experience. The Short-Term Mission Team Training Guides provide a

curriculum for the mission team. helping them before, during, and after their mission experience. The **Pre-Trip Preparation and Training** Guide walks the team through all the facets of preparation: Bible study, teambuilding, cross-cultural ministry skills, and logistics. The On-Site Devotional and Reflection Guide is spiral bound, so it's easy to toss in your suitcase. It contains ten devotionals with space to record and process your thoughts and experiences. The Post-Trip Debriefing and Action Guide contains three sessions and information to help the team through reentry and determine how to apply what they learned to their current situation.

BEING SERVANTS OF GOD

The guides are built on the foundation of "GOD'S Principles for Successful Short-Term Mission Trips." GOD'S stands for:

God is the head of the program.

Open heart, open hands.

Doing is less important than being.

A Servant's heart.

These principles underline how the team should go about any mission experience. Ann Borquist, author of the training guides and former International Ministries missionary, shares her experience with short-term mission teams, which led her to write these guides.

"As missionaries in the Philippines, my husband and

I hosted a number of short-term mission teams as well as individual volunteers. The best, most effective teams were those that came with an attitude of 'we want to serve and learn' rather than 'we know what's best and so we're going to do it for you.' They had some ideas about how to help, but they looked to our Filipino sisters and brothers for guidance on how and where best to share their skills and experience."

Ann sought to create a resource through which volunteer teams can prepare so that the team and partners in the host country can have the best possible experience.


