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Deepening Our Discipleship – Focus on Spiritual Formation

The *Transformed by the Spirit* initiative has helped change the outlook of American Baptist congregations. Through this emphasis congregations are being urged to more fully engage their communities and the world for the sake of the gospel. However, a church which is outwardly focused in mission can only be sustained by a strengthening of the discipleship of its members. Just as a tree can only grow as far as its root system will sustain it, so a congregation can actively engage in outward mission only as far as their rootedness in Christ will permit.

The focus statement adopted by American Baptists several years ago twinned these two aspects of Christian life and ministry.

American Baptist Churches are Healthy Missional Churches that Nurture Devoted Disciples of Jesus Christ who Live their Lives in Mission and ministry for the Healing of the World through the Love of God.

Vibrant Christian communities engage in personal and corporate spiritual disciplines and practices which invite one into a deeper experience of Christ as devoted disciples. Vibrant Christian communities engage the world as the hands and feet of Christ for the sake of its healing.

As an outgrowth of *Transformed by the Spirit*, in 2014, ABCUSA introduced a two-year initiative in spiritual formation which has been received as an essential aspect of sustaining the outward missional efforts of our congregations. Because it was well-received. In 2016, this initiative entered its third year. This initiative has focus on three primary areas of emphasis.

1. Rhythms of the Spirit retreats

High values of the Retreat aspect of *Rhythms of the Spirit*

1. To provide a full three days of daily spiritual rhythm based on the historic Christian monastic day as developed by the Benedictine tradition. This includes a rhythm of praying the Psalms, reflective and meditative singing, silence, a devotional reading of scripture called Lectio Divina, a focus on spiritual practice and the great silence at night. Our hope is that, as participants experience this rhythm, they will be motivated to appropriate aspects of it in their daily lives.

- 2. Partnering with ABCUSA Camp and Conference organizations to provide space for these retreats. This generous partnering keeps retreat costs down and creates a united spiritual vision among a variety of ABC organizations. The partner organizations have included The Green Lake Conference Center in Wisconsin, Redwood Glen Camp and Conference Center in California and Camp Canonicus in Rhode Island.
- 3. Creating unique, diverse teams of leaders within the ABC to provide spiritual leadership for the retreats. Four different teams have been created to lead Rhythms retreats. 1. - 4. Providing Spiritual Direction throughout the retreat to signal the importance of this emerging ministry. Rhythms leadership teams are made up of certified Spiritual Directors. Throughout the retreat, participants may sign up for oneon-one spiritual direction with one of the leadership team. It is my hope that the ministry of spiritual direction will be provided at all future denominational conferences and retreats.
- 5. Partnering with ABC organizations to cooperate with programming and communication. In 2016, two rhythms retreats are scheduled. The July 2016 retreat will be held at Green Lake and is in cooperation with the International Ministries World Mission Conference. A Rhythms of the Spirit retreat begins in the evening of the final day of the Mission Conference. In our marketing materials, IM is promoting Rhythms and Rhythms is promoting the Mission Conference. The August 2016 Rhythms retreat will be incorporated into the Ministers Council pastor's conference to be held outside Washington DC. This high value of partnership is meant to demonstrate that life in the Spirit is cooperative and unifying.

Results: The Rhythms retreats have been very well received by those who participate. These kinds of comments are common.

Participants have come from across the country and represent a diverse cross-section of denominational life. Average attendance is from 15 – 25 participants. 2. Network of American Baptist Spiritual Directors.

We are aware of more and more American Baptists, both clergy and lay, who are expressing their vocation of Christian ministry in serving as spiritual directors. This is a new phenomenon in ABC life and in the past, ABCUSA has not sought to identify and network those involved in this growing ministry specialty. Over the past two years, a network of American Baptists who have been or are being trained in spiritual direction. Much like the ABCUSA-initiated biennial gatherings of ABC-related theologians has been well received as an expression of the denomination's interest and concern for its theologians, so, too, we believe that this effort signals the denomination's awareness of this expression of Christian vocation and will offer important support to American Baptists in this ministry path. 3. The Practice of Pilgrimage

An ancient form of spiritual practice that is being re-appropriated by the Protestant tradition is the practice of pilgrimage. One definition of pilgrimage is as follows:

A pilgrimage is a ritual journey with a hallowed purpose. Every step along the way has meaning. The pilgrim knows that life giving challenges will emerge. A pilgrimage is not a vacation; it is a transformational journey during which significant change takes place. New insights are given. Deeper understanding is attained. New and old places in the heart are visited. Blessings are received and healing takes place. On return from the pilgrimage, life is seen with different eyes. Nothing will ever be quite the same again.

The Rhythms of the Spirit initiative is managed, coordinated and developed by the Rev. Brad Berglund. Brad and his wife Rita, have developed a ministry of Spiritual Formation and pilgrimage that is seasoned and has hosted more than 500 participants in the past 18 years.

Evaluation: Rhythms of the Spirit is off to a good start. The past two years have been a success.

Because Brad's position with ABCUSA is project-focused and part-time, it is necessary for these high-value programs to find ways to be communicated and promoted within the wider denominational family. Help is needed to promote the existing program. Help is also needed to imagine the future and the many ways an emphasis on spiritual practice, spiritual direction and pilgrimage can be incorporated more fully into denominational life.

Moving Forward: Success in the future can be determined by the degree to which denominational life becomes permeated with a focus on spiritual practice and spiritual formation.
