Camp Lake Louise Background Info

Prepared November 5, 2018

History and setting

Camp Lake Louise is an American Baptist camp located on nearly 24 acres of lakefront property in northern Michigan. Most of the activity at Camp Lake Louise is during the summer, though there are other events offered sporadically throughout the year and the facility is open to outside rentals.

The camp is located on Thumb Lake. The Horner family, early-twentieth century landowners, compared the lake to Lake Louise in Banff National Park and the name stuck. The Horners donated their land to Methodist ministry and nearly all the land around the lake (and all the property surrounding Camp Lake Louise) is now owned by Lake Louise Christian Community, a Methodist-affiliated 501(c)(3) organization. Methodist camping at Lake Louise Christian Community began in 1935. Baptists began their camp, on land initially rented from Lake Louise Christian Community, in 1937.

At some point, the Michigan Baptist Convention gained title to the land for Camp Lake Louise. In 1987, the Michigan Baptist Convention granted a Right of First Refusal to the Lake Louise Christian Community. If the Michigan Baptist Convention ever "desires or intends to sell [the land of Camp Lake Louise] to anyone other than a related or affiliated entity," the Lake Louise Christian Community has the right to purchase the property on the same terms at the same price. (The Michigan Baptist Convention is an affiliate of ABC of Michigan.)

Plans for Camp Lake Louise

ABC of Michigan has a vision for how Camp Lake Louise can reach more children. Part of that vision involves grant funding from outside groups, some of whom have restrictions on funding religious entities. Just as some churches establish non-profit affiliates that can accept outside grants, ABC of Michigan plans to establish Camp Lake Louise as a separate 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. The Michigan Baptist Convention will then transfer the camp property to the new non-profit. As part of this process, ABC of Michigan established a separate Board of Directors to be involved in leadership of the camp, even as it was still owned by the Michigan Baptist Convention.

There is concern that "spinning-off" Camp Lake Louise may trigger the Right of First Refusal. ABC of Michigan sought legal advice on that matter. According to their attorney's response in March 2018, "It is our opinion that [this] plan can be accomplished without triggering the Right of First Refusal if you structure the Transfer as a gift rather than as a sale, and if you establish

Camp Lake Louise as an affiliate of MBC." (The Bylaws of the ABC of Michigan provide for "related organizations." Presumably, a similar option is available in the Bylaws of the Michigan Baptist Convention.)

ABC of Michigan's attorney also supplied a list of a number of ways in which it could be demonstrated that Camp Lake Louise would be an "affiliated entity" of the Michigan Baptist Convention, thus ensuring that the Right of First Refusal would not be triggered. Of those eleven suggestions, one mentioned ABC: "Requiring a certain number of the directors [of Camp Lake Louise] have a strong connection to MBC/ABC, such as being members of the denomination, or having family members who are or were members."

In 2008, ABC of Michigan granted greater independence to Camp Lake Louise and encouraged the formation of a Board of Directors to manage the camp (with the camp still remaining owned by ABC of Michigan and still incorporated in the region's financials.) A few weeks ago, that Board and the ABC-MI Executive Committee agreed to dissolve the Camp Lake Louise Board and an Advisory Committee was appointed to shepherd Camp Lake Louise through the process of becoming a separate corporation.

Request for AMO status

In July 2018, a representative of Camp Lake Louise contacted David Knipel, ABCUSA's counsel, regarding ways for Camp Lake Louise to show association with ABCUSA without using ABCUSA's group tax exemption. Knipel suggested that affiliation as an Associated Ministry Organization might be one way to accomplish that goal.

On August 13, 2018, Michael Williams, executive minister of ABC of Michigan, spoke to General Secretary Lee Spitzer concerning AMO status. That same day, Williams sent Spitzer a letter requesting AMO status for Camp Lake Louise. In that letter, Williams wrote "The American Baptist Churches of Michigan and the Camp Lake Louise Advisory Council, after conversation with our own legal counsel and ABCUSA legal counsel, believe the granting of AMO status to Camp Lake Louise would address the unique need of Camp Lake Louise to evidence an association with the ABCUSA without being part of the ABCUSA group exemption."

On September 15, 2018, the BGM Executive Committee considered the request for AMO status and spoke with Williams by telephone. When asked about the "unique need" mentioned in his letter, Williams stated that there was concern about potential loss of the property if control was turned over to the new Camp Lake Louise organization.

Some on the BGM Executive Committee were uncomfortable with the concept of granting AMO status to a camp, wondering about the precedent that might be set. There was also a desire to learn more about the land situation. Paul Higgins was asked to work with David Knipel to prepare a report for the Executive Committee for consideration at the November 2018 meeting.

When Knipel's mother died, Higgins chose to contact Williams instead and prepared this report based on information supplied by Williams, camp board member Bruce Johnson, and other public sources. A draft of this report was sent to Knipel for review.

Requirements to become an Associated Ministry Organization

From Standing Rule 17.1:

Requirement	Current status
"Must be a national or sectional American Baptist or other religious organization"	Camp Lake Louise's operations have historically been at the regional level, not national or sectional

One is a member of an ABC church and son of a former General Board member. The third is historically ABC but is not currently a member of an ABC congregation. According to Williams, "The new Board will be compelled to have strong ABC-MI representation in their governing documents and I have every expectation that will happen."
"Define its own ministry"	Camp Lake Louise clearly defines a ministry distinct and separate from that of others.
"Engage staff persons who are accountable to its governing board"	Camp Lake Louise has a chief operating officer and has unfilled openings for an executive director, resident manager, and a resident program manager.
"Insure its own financial solvency"	The annual report requested by the BGM Executive Committee did not include financial details. The most recently received audit from ABC of Michigan combined financial results for the two camps, making it impossible to discern if either are financially solvent. Williams stated "Camp Lake Louise is financially stable and has remained in the black each year since granted 'greater managerial independence' in 2008." Further financial details are included later in this document.

Statement from Advisory Committee member Bruce Johnson

The camp exists to serve the church. If we are not able to do so, frankly there is not much reason to exist. In today's day and age, we have seen our Lord's deep interest in serving the needs of modern day "widows and orphans". We are a catalyst of sorts. We are seeking to plant really good seed (Christ's love and community) in really good soil (the camp).

In the past, the denomination would send the kids and families to the camp and then back they would go to their ABC churches. In today's day and age, we are seeing approximately ¼ of our children and families coming from ABC churches. However, approximately ½ of our campers are coming from completely unchurched backgrounds. We believe this is amazing but it comes with certain new responsibilities in regard to being faithful to these lives God is sending. After a week of camp and the spiritual formations taking place, we need to partner with churches in receiving them into their local faith communities. I believe with all my heart this is a model completely in line with who the ABC church is and the values she holds true.

What we are seeing take place at this little camp in northern Michigan, I believe is a small but powerful reflection of what the Lord wants to do across the entire country. What if the ABC was a forerunner in seeking ways to bring new life in to the church. Certainly many, many churches are already doing so but the vast number of unchurched we are seeing is evidence of the great need. The church has always been Gods best plan for growing families, especially those without fathers

Please think of this AMO as a potential voice for the many abandoned mothers and fatherless children as well as those who grew up not truly knowing the Father heart of God in Christ. Today, homes with children have approximately 30% without a father present.

This has been a growing and disturbing trend and the statistics are so alarming for the children. Praise God, He will move Heaven and earth when we align ourselves with those who matter to Him.

I pray the ABC sees the AMO to be a partner in this way. When I was 10, an elderly gentleman spoke the words into my life, at this camp, speaking of Gods promise to be a father to the fatherless and a defender of widows in His Holy dwelling. I see that same promise as a great hope for millions across the country.

RIGHT OF FIRST REPUSAL

REGISTER OF DEEDS
For a good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, MICHIGAN BAPTIST CONVENTION, a Michigan corporation of 4610 S. Hagadorn, East Lansing, Michigan 48823-5396, hereby grants and conveys unto LAKE LOUISE CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY, a Michigan Corporation, of Route 1, Box 97, Boyne Falls, Michigan 49713, a right of first refusal to purchase the real property hereinafter described, upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth.

The real property which is subject to this Right of First Refusal is described as being situated in the Township of Hudson, County of Charlevoix, State of Michigan, to-wit:

Those portions of the following described real property lying North of the meander line of Lake Louise (formerly Thumb Lake), said description being as follows: Commencing at a 1/2" iron rod (L.L.S. cap No. 20703) at the Northeast corner of Section 2, Township 32 North, Range 4 West; thence along the North line of said section (center line of Stafford Road, a county road) North 88°18'06" West 1306.68 feet to a T-iron stake at the East eighth corner; thence along said eighth line South 0°20'37" West 1327.90 feet to a T-iron stake at the Northwest corner of Government Lot 1, being the POINT OF BEGINNING of this description; thence continuing along the North line of said Government Lot 1, also being the North eighth line South 88°56'58" East 654.91 feet to a T-iron stake; thence along the East line of the West half of said Government Lot 1 South 0°16'11" West 1042.52 feet to a T-iron stake on the shore of Thumb Lake (also known as Lake Louise); thence along a meander line on the shore of said lake North 73°42'33" West 123.83 feet to a T-iron stake; thence North 86°41'24" West 235.87 feet to a T-iron stake; thence North 66°41'24" West 332.86 feet to a T-iron stake, thence North 60°37'00" West 332.86 feet to a T-iron stake on a line common to Government Lots 1 and 2, also being the East eighth line; thence continuing along said meander line North 60°17'09" West 376.22 feet to a T-iron stake on the West line of the East quarter of Government Lot 2; thence leaving said shore meander line North 0°22'47" East 683.00 feet along said west line on the East quarter of Government Lot 2, also being the North eighth line, thence along said eighth line, also being the North eighth line, thence along said eighth line, also being the North eighth line, thence along said eighth line, also being the North eighth line, thence along said eighth line, also being the North eighth line of beginning; being part of Government Lots 1 and 2, Section 2, Township 32 North, Range 4 West and containing 20.495 acres of land within the perimeter

In the event that, at any time in the future, the Grantor herein desires or intends to sell the real property herein described to anyone other than a related or affiliated entity, it shall provide written notice of such intention to the Grantee herein, which written notice shall contain the name of the purposed purchaser, the price and terms upon which such purposed sale is to be made. Upon receiving such written notification, the Grantee herein shall have a period of forty-five (45) days from and after such receipt within which to exercise the Right of

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First Refusal herein granted. Such right shall be exercised by giving Grantor written notice within said 45 day period. Upon such exercise the Grantee shall be entitled to purchase the said property upon the same price and terms as purposed for sale to any third party.

The failure of the Grantee to respond to such written notification within said period of forty-five (45) days, shall render this Right of First Refusal null and void.

All notices required hereunder shall be in writing, and sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the address shown herein, or to such other address as may hereafter be provided to either party.

This Right of First Refusal shall be binding upon and shall inur to the benefit of the successors and assigns of the parties hereto and shall run with the land.
