- 1. provide opportunities for people to discover God and deepen relationship with him through engagement with soil (growing) and through building relationship with each other at the garden site and through the food distribution process,

3. Specifically, how do you plan to use the requested funds?

The breakdown of the requested funds will be used toward improving our ability to maximize vegetable growth by improving and amending the soil to accommodate the intensive planting necessary to increase the shares we are able to provide on the one acre plot we are leasing. As a minimum, we will create permanent raised beds in the 70'x30' hoop house. If funding permits, we will also begin the process of creating permanent raised beds within the 1-acre field. This will allow us to work smarter, allow for intensive planting, and will make for easier harvesting of our crops. It will also significantly increase our crop yield potential, thereby increasing the amount of food we are able to grow our one-acre allotment. This increase of food production will directly benefit our target audience, those currently living below, or just above, the poverty line.

Seeds and starts, soil amendments

The majority of the \$2000.00 in this line item will go towards creating permanent raised beds and soil amendments needed per soil testing results.

Because we are in the 2nd year of the **Markey Food Project**, without the *Matthew 25 Grant*, we will be able to provide weekly shares of a variety of fresh, locally grown, organically grown vegetables to three (and up to five families) who are living in poverty within our community. With the *Matthew 25 Grant* fully funded, we will potentially be able to target **up to ten additional families.**

4. How will the funds assist individuals battling poverty and its effects?

Roscommon County is one of the top counties in the State of Michigan in poverty for total population and also one of the top two counties in Michigan for childhood poverty. Access to locally available clean, fresh food is limited for a large portion of people within our county.

The **Markey Food Project**, a ministry of Markey Church, is focusing on developing a market garden concept in which locally grown food using organic processes will be made available to people of need within our community. People living in poverty are not as likely to have either the access to or resources to purchase fresh, organically grown local foods. For this reason, the **Markey Food Project** is in the position to begin to address this by growing and distributing locally grown, organically grown foods to people in need within Roscommon County, with a long-term goal of actually providing opportunities for employment to people. During 2015, our start up year, we were able to provide weekly shares to four families within our church community.

This ministry developed through discussion in an adult Sunday School Class over several seasons. In the summer of 2014, during a study of David L Nichols' book, *Learning to Love Your Neighbor*, our long-time discussions turned into action. Initial plans were to begin this project on church property. Yet, one of the couples in the class owns a farm with property adjacent to Markey Church property. They made the generous offer to us to use a one-acre plot that contains a 70'x30' hoop house, and is surrounded by an 8' deer fence, a necessity in rural northern Michigan. It was decided to operate the project like a CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) to provide necessary funding for start-up. During this pilot year, we had 24 share memberships, which funded the pilot, and share members also provided over 2000 hours of labor. We were also able to donate four shares to individuals/families within our church community who are living at/below poverty level. In addition, individual share members gave portions of or all of their weekly share boxes to neighbors or friends. For additional information on the 2015 season, please refer to an article that appeared in the *Houghton Lake Resorter* featuring the start-up year of the **Markey Food Project**.

The 2016 season will be the 2nd year of this ministry and we're continuing to call it a pilot. During the initial season in 2015, we were backyard gardeners, all with our own diverse experiences in gardening, coming together to see what we could grow together. We have committed to being more intentional during the 2016 season to learning how to bring all of our diverse experiences together to develop a market garden, intended to feed many off an acre of land using the concepts in *The Market Gardener*, by Jean-Martin Fortier (New Society Publishers, 2014). It is our intent during the 2016 season, with the support of the *Matthew 25 Grant* to provide shares to a minimum of ten + families. The *Matthew 25 Grant* will be used to help fund the cost of these shares. (Cost of a share is computed at \$25.00 / week for a minimum of 20 weeks for a total cost of \$500 / share for a total of \$5,000.) In addition to receiving food shares weekly from mid-June through mid-October, the families will be invited and encouraged to join us in the planting, tending and harvesting of food weekly, participate in opportunities to learn how to utilize, prepare and store the variety of fresh foods that will be in the weekly share boxes. It is during these times when we work side by side that God steps in and provides opportunities for us to grow closer to Him and to each other.

Markey Food Project is certainly about food. Clean (i.e. chemically-free), organically grown, locally grown food. But, more importantly, it's about building relationships with each other and through this, growing in our relationship with God. We long to go where God is leading us, to renew and restore and reconcile all things in the world, in our state but particularly in Roscommon County.
