

ABCUSA MATTHEW 25 GRANT APPLICATION - 2018



A generous donor has given a sum of money through American Baptist Churches USA Office of the General Secretary, to be used for programs that address "housing, feeding, education and health with regard to the less fortunate." A panel will select recipients for grants of up to \$5,000. Awards will be granted only to ministries of an American Baptist church in good standing with their Region. This is a change from previous grant cycles. We will no longer award grants to organizations affiliated with churches such as a cooperative group that includes non-ABC churches; applications must be submitted by an ABC church for work being done directly by that church.

Only one application per church will be considered within a 24-month period.

Grant funds may not be used to fund staff positions, rainy day funds, church benevolent funds, regular ongoing church operating expenses (i.e. utilities, insurance), repairs, or for capital improvements or repairs to facilities. Grant awards will be sent to the ABC church that is applying for the grant; checks will not be made payable to an individual or ministry.

Research shows that children in poverty can lose several months of reading proficiency they have learned that school year, during summer vacation. The SHARE program targets the children of the local food pantry's clients to provide them with summer reading books and learning activities. The program helps these children to have access to their own books to read over vacation. We also aim to start these youngsters out feeling prepared and ready to learn in a new school year with a new backpack and the appropriate school supplies needed in their classroom. Back to school is a very expensive time for families struggling to get by. We aim to give these students tools to start off the school year successfully.

When determining Grants awards, the following criteria will be considered: whether the church is in good standing within the region; whether the church contributes to United Mission; number of and amounts of previous Matthew 25 Grants received; sustainability of ministry beyond Matthew 25 Grant funding; description of ministry and needs addressed by funding; and the budget submitted along with this application.

Checks will be made payable to the church. Checks will not be made to an individual or ministry.

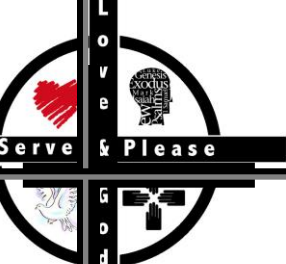

S.H.A.R.E.- Summer Health- Activities- Reading Education A Program of the Mission Ministry Team, First Baptist Church of Syracuse, NY

Mission: The SHARE Program was developed with the goal of providing summer reading materials, workbooks and additional supplementary food to the school age children whose families receive benefits from the JDEFP (Jamesville DeWitt Ecumenical Food Pantry). Our hope is that providing literacy materials to children in need has a positive effect on their desire to maintain their level of literacy throughout the summer months.

Research shows that children in poverty can lose over three months of reading proficiency they have achieved that school year, during summer vacation. By the time they are in high school, they have lost several years of growth, in comparison to their middle- class classmates. This program is a means to begin trying to change that statistic.

In addition, we aim to help every child start the new school year with a brand new backpack and school supplies. Back to school shopping is a difficult strain on low income families, and we want each child to feel confident and ready to learn in September!

Program History: I was asked to take over the SHARE program in 2010 by Pastor Scott Kavanagh. As an educator, I was passionate about education for all children. The first year the program was well funded, but soon grant funds ran out. Over the years, the funds available for this program have gone down, but the mission ministry team has made sure it has continued. It is necessary to shop all year for clearance mark downs and store free materials when offered. My teenagers help pack book packs and drive them to the pantry each summer. When the funds run low, we have made it part our family's budget to support this program.

Over the last four years, our church has been in transition with senior pastors and there has been a decline in attendance. But interest and support for this program has continued. A few times a year, opportunities are given at church to support hunger/poverty programs, and the money is spent on the SHARE program and well as providing 2-3 meals /year at a local soup kitchen in Syracuse, the Samaritan Center. Over the last few years, at Christmas we have provided children at the pantry with a "replenishment pack" of supplies to start the second semester. This past year, the director has passed out materials for children's birthdays, and packs to caregivers/grandparents to use with children they care for.

Grant money would allow us to increase the programs impact by providing more books and materials, as well as allowing the Pantry Director funds to purchase supplemental food for school-aged families who have children home during the summer. This would allow our Mission Ministry Team extra funds collected in church offerings to support an additional meals next year at the Samaritan Center, helping alleviate hunger further in our community.

Program Statistics:

2009- Program started with a grant. 45 book packs in July and 52 book packets in August, 55 backpacks and supplies distributed, plus supplemental food for school aged families.

2010- This is when I started. No grant money left. Funds from church and donations from here on out. 36 book packs in July, 52 book packs in August, 46 backpacks, supplemental food for families, Story time was offered 2 times over the summer.

2011- 63 book packets (one distribution), 53 backpacks/ school supplies

2012- Leftover materials (books, flash cards, workbooks) left out for families to take- no funds for book packs), 46 backpacks

2013- 54 book materials, 45-50 backpacks

2014- 40 book packets, 45 backpacks/school supplies

2015 and 2016- 50 book packets, 45 backpack school supplies, left books at pantry for distribution during the year and birthdays.

2017- Prepared 50 reading/activity packs, 43 backpacks distributed

2018- Prepared 55 reading/activity packets, 40 backpacks distributed as of late August
