

ABCUSA MATTHEW 25 GRANT APPLICATION

A generous donor has given a sum of money through American Baptist Churches USA to be used for programs that address "housing, feeding, education and health with regard to the less fortunate." A panel will select recipients for grants of up to \$5,000 largely based on the degree to which the funds will be used to directly assist persons in poverty. Ministries must be in relationship with American Baptist Churches USA to be eligible to apply, and only one application per church or ministry will be considered per year. Grant funds may not be used to fund staff positions.

Matthew 25 Request

The members of Lake Street Church (LSC) are committed to looking deeply together for ways to live our commitment to fulfill the biblical imperative to care for our neighbors (Matthew 25). Our Peace and Justice Committee (P&J) helps the congregation find ways to change the lives of those who suffer hunger, homelessness and other challenges of poverty and inequality. Our members have a long history of volunteering and contributing time, money, food, clothing and services. But as our ministries expand to meet the multiple needs identified, we look to the ABC Matthew 25 Fund to augment our resources to do this work.

Since 1984, LSC has been a driving force and the host site for Hilda's Place, now Evanston's main homeless shelter, operating from our church annex basement. While many services have now been built into the shelter's program through our external partner, Connections (an Evanston social service agency for the homeless), our P&J group, Sustenance Connection, continues to offer hospitality, and build personal relationships with our guests by hosting two dinners monthly, each feeding 35 to 45 people. Members bring prepared dishes and create some of the meal in our community kitchen, while P&J subsidizes main dishes and drinks. Our members also host annual holiday dinners for the shelter guests including additional community drop-in guests. The priceless opportunity for our members to join the Hilda's Place residents for these meals provides invaluable food for the soul for all participants.

LSC is now partnering with Connections for a new venture. This fall we are co-piloting a culinary arts job training program open to 8-10 Hilda's Place residents and formerly homeless residents at our nearby YMCA. While Connections will provide the actual training portion, LSC will grow its capacity as a community kitchen by adding equipment and components specifically necessary for class work as well as providing classroom ingredients. The food created by the classes will be shared with needy individuals in the community.

Another hunger-targeted effort is our sandwich-making project in which we meet monthly in LSC's community kitchen to make, pack and deliver sandwiches and other food items for distribution on the streets of under-served neighborhoods of Chicago through our partners from the Night Ministry.

We also have a growing ministry at Lake Street that embraces the struggle of our immigrant brothers and sisters in an era where delayed reform creates inhumane situations. One of our projects is to accompany immigrants who find themselves in a limbo between inhumanely scheduled court dates. They are turned out on the streets from detention with only the clothes on their back at the time of incarceration, lacking sufficient clothing and basic toiletries. We pick them up at court and help them find their way to their families across the country or to temporary housing locally. An essential element is our providing backpacks of basic clothing (including critical winter-wear) and personal care items to sustain them through that difficult transition period.

We seek a total of \$5000 to augment our member contributions for our community kitchen and immigration accompaniment work. (Details in the budget narrative on the Financial Statement page.)
