THE HOPE PROJECT

McGee Avenue Baptist Church is one of the oldest congregations in the City of Berkeley and has a long history of social activism and community service to homeless and impoverished individuals. For the past 30 years the Church has provided hot meals three days a week to the homeless, the poor and the indigent in its weekly food program. The church has received grant funds from the City of Berkeley for the past 15 years to support this food program.

The church is developing the HOPE Project to assist homeless individuals and their families in accessing community resources to promote their successful transition to a stable lifestyle. Through the HOPE Project, the church will expand its efforts to eliminate poverty by providing access to resources in addition to weekly meals. Inspired by the famous Chinese proverb, "give a man a fish and you feed him for a day; teach a man to fish and you feed him for a lifetime," the HOPE Project will provide on-site computers for individuals to utilize to access resources for housing, employment and education. Many of the individuals and families served through the church's food program do not have access to computers making it impossible for them to connect with or navigate necessary support systems. The HOPE Project's computers will provide individuals with access to a wide range of online resources to help rebuild their lives.

Through the HOPE Project we will provide homeless and indigent individuals with access to computers for checking emails, preparing resumes, conducting job searches and searching for available housing. Three computers will be set up adjacent to the dining hall for use by community members. A printer station will also be provided for preparation of resumes or other forms. HOPE Project Leaders will be available to assist and/or train individuals in preparing resumes and/or conducting job searches. This will be an invaluable service to the participants in the program as many are living on the streets or in shelters and do not have access to computers or any means of printing documents. Providing access to computers for employment and housing searches will provide the tools needed to bridge the gap between remaining unemployed and/or living in a shelter to obtaining employment and/or receiving stable housing. The HOPE Project will maintain a log of individuals utilizing the computers and successfully accessing resources.

The HOPE Project also seeks to assist the church's food program in providing healthy meals to eliminate the chronic health diseases that continue to plague the community, particularly the homeless community. Specifically, the HOPE Project will provide protein products to include in weekly hot meals for indigent and homeless individuals. The lack of access to healthy foods can increase the risk of chronic disease which the HOPE Project seeks to counteract by providing healthy meat and other protein foods for meals. While the church receives a small grant and donations for its food program, this is not enough to provide nutritious and healthy food products. The church relies primarily on a patchwork of volunteers and donations to provide healthy meals therefore, the donations of food provided through the HOPE Project will be invaluable in supporting the church's continued effort to provide nutritious meals.

The church, through the HOPE Project, will utilize the funds provided through the Matthew 25 Grant to provide impoverished individuals with increased access to computer resources and healthy meals to assist them in developing stable and productive lives.
