Income

\$1400 per month/\$16,800 per year

This amount is the space use fee paid by two of the member programs. The costs for space for the other programs are provided by the church.

Expenditures

Staffing The SLCOC has a volunteer Director of Programs

All but three of the ministries are staffed by volunteers and operate on donations and in kind contributions. The other three have separate sources of income to support their staffing and operational needs.

Space and Utilities

The programs of the SLCOC occupy approximately 11,000 square feet of space with an annual cost of \$30,000.00

We are seeking assistance in meeting the \$13,200 shortfall.

The congregation is not able to house these programs without significant support from other sources.

How do you plan to use the requested funds? How will the funds specifically assist individuals battling poverty and its effects?

We plan to use the requested funds to support the work of the James Perkins Youth Development Center. The center provides educational support services for at risk youth in the Northwest section of Rochester, New York. A report by Rochester Area Community Foundation and ACT Rochester found that Rochester is:

Fifth poorest city in the country among the top 75 largest metropolitan areas;

Second poorest among comparably sized cities in those metro areas;

Ranked third for highest concentration of extremely poor neighborhoods among cities in the top 100 metro areas;

The poorest school district in Upstate New York and the poorest urban district in the entire state.

The JPYDC has a unique approach in addressing the problems of educational outcomes for students living in poverty. Mr. James Perkins, a teacher in the Rochester City School District for more than thirty years had a distinguished record of enabling academic success from children from any background. His mantra which has become the motto for the center is "results...not excuses." Mr. Perkins who was a member of St. Luke Tabernacle left an indelible mark on the students he taught.

The Center's summer program enrolled more than 60 students with many more turned away for lack of space and resources. Our school year tutorial program has filled more than half the available slots prior to the opening of registration. The funds requested will be used to purchase notebook computers for our computer lab and televisions for our recreation room. (we recently suffered a break in at our building and our computers were taken, as well as two televisions). We would also use the funds to equip our homework room with reference materials and finally, to provide tokens of appreciation to our tutors and volunteers.

Eight notebook computers at \$300 each for a total of \$2400.00

Two flat screen televisions at \$400 each for a total of \$800.00

Reference materials for homework room for a total of \$800.00

Gift Cards for 20 volunteers at \$50.00 each for a total of \$1000.00

St. Luke attempts to live into our motto of bringing The Word to the World. We have moved our service to our community to the next level. We have established the St. Luke Community of Care. This association of community outreach ministries provides a variety of services and supports aimed at strengthening families through health, education and personal empowerment. Currently, the Community of Care houses a program for children with autism, an afterschool youth development program and an affiliated charitable foundation. A performing arts program as well as a program that provides support for women in crisis is also part of the Community of Care.

A central component of the Community of Care is the health and wellness center which partners with the School of Medicine and Dentistry at the University of Rochester to sponsor a walk-in urgent care clinic where clients receive basic medical services free of charge. Future programs are in the planning stages, including a community education program and a family services center. All of these services form a collaborative association designed to improve the lives of people who live in the Maplewood neighborhood of Rochester. Through a shared vision of service to our community and a common commitment to improving the lives of our neighbors, we are addressing some of the more pressing needs in the lives of our citizens. Women Saving Women

This is a program designed to reach out to women in our community who are living with physical and emotional trauma. This program will provide a supportive environment for healing and wholeness.

Northstar Collaborative for the Performing Arts

The Northstar Collaborative for the Performing Arts provides opportunities for youth and adults to develop their artistic abilities through drama and music.

Northwest Neighborhood Outreach Center

The NNOC provides meals for persons in need and operates a clothing store. These programs also provides opportunities for training and personal development.

Grace Community Village

The GCV provides a supportive environment for person to develop life management skills and to achieve success.

FUTURE PROGRAMS

Greater Rochester Academy for Community Education

The mission of GRACE is to provide community based educational resources for the Maplewood Neighborhood and beyond.
