Back Pack Program — The back pack program was started in 2011-2012 school year at two of our neighborhood junior high schools. The program was started to keep kids healthy and keep them in school. The school counselors and school teachers make referrals of students who at the end of the month may not have food available to them when they go home or over the weekends. If students are hungry they cannot focus on school, they cannot stay healthy, and they may not even attend school.

The back pack program helps kids get healthy food in a quiet and unassuming fashion so that the other students don't realize they need this assistance. They take home the back pack on a Friday and return it on Monday to be refilled at the end of the month.

The program recruits High School students to unload the supplies, fill the back packs, and deliver the back packs to the Jr High School. This gives the High School students a great community service to students in their own neighborhood. One of the students volunteering has been a recipient of a back pack in Jr. High and know is helping others.

Funds from the grant would be used to purchase the food to fill the back packs. There are no labor costs or administrative costs to this program. The snacks are purchased at River Bend Food Bank. The typical food included each month: juice, granola bars, cereal, canned fruit and peanut butter and jelly. Funds are used strictly to feed the less fortunate in hopes of them continuing their education to become productive citizens of our community. Cost is approximately \$5.00 per month per student x 10 months = \$50.00 per school year x 100 students = \$5,000.
