## Program Description: Martindale-Brightwood Family Stability Project

The Edna Martin Christian Center (EMCC), an American Baptist Home Mission Society Neighborhood Action Program in Indianapolis, IN. We offer comprehensive family strengthening and self-sufficiency programs and services dedicated primarily to the families of the Martindale-Brightwood neighborhood. (near north-eastside of Indianapolis). Our mission provides an array of programs and services, including food pantry access, rent and utility assistance, youth development, senior programs, healthy habits classes, financial literacy instruction, self-sufficiency workshops to youth, seniors and families in need.

We are applying for the Matthew 25 grant to prevent and intervene in homelessness for families in our neighborhood through our Martindale-Brightwood Family Stability Project (MBFSP). The funds will be used to help with emergency rent and fees that put families at risk of becoming homeless. This program is in it's third year and is dedicated to assisting children of families in danger of losing their housing, often resulting in unplanned moves and tremendous instability. Over the last three years, EMCC has prevented homelessness for 80 families (families consist of 4-6 individuals in each household).

MBFSP addresses access to community programs/services and focuses on emergency needs so children can remain in the same school, giving them the best chance to succeed academically, while simultaneously focusing on the parents' issues regarding unemployment, financial management and risk of homelessness. This is a partnership of schools and service organizations managed by EMCC and operated in Indianapolis Public Schools 48, 51, 56 and 69. Funds will be used to directly help at risk children and their families.

Our service area includes some of the highest and foreclosure and unemployment rates in the state of Indiana, thus resulting in an unstable environment where joblessness and homelessness are directly related to transient families and to youth desperately in need of assistance. The neighborhood we serve has a high concentration of poverty with 35% of our families are living at or below the poverty level and 65% of adults 18 and older not having a high school education. The children of these families are in a state of constant upheaval, thus leading to difficulty in school and eventually high dropout rates and low high school graduation rates. The MBSFP is focused on keeping children in their same school environments in order to give them the best chance to succeed academically, and to help their families achieve a state of stability, both fiscal and behavioral.

Families with children are our first priority, and we demonstrate this commitment to youth by operating this program within Indianapolis Public Schools 48,51, 56 and 69. Children are offered a variety of youth programming, with a direct focus on education and educational stability. Parents and families are offered Crisis Intervention services (immediate care), STEPS Stabilization Program (enrollment commitment required) and Center for Working Families Asset Development Services (enrollment commitment required). They will also receive food, clothing, and assistance with housing expenses to keep them stable.

Families in our service area consist of 4-6 in each household. Therefore, EMCC will focus on 50 families (200+ individuals directly and indirectly impacted) for 2014. Of the 50 families, 60% (30 families) will not be homeless during the course of the school year; 90% (27) of successful families will remain stable in housing during the course of the school year; and 60% of school aged children in families served will remain stable in school during the course of the school year.
