Dr. Beverly Mitchell

Dr. Beverly Eileen Mitchell is Professor of Historical Theology at Wesley Theological Seminary, in Washington, DC, where she teaches courses in theology, church history, African American religious history, feminist and womanist theologies, poverty, and human rights.
